Pay 25 Levy & Budget Update

The 2024 pay 2025 truth in taxation meeting is on Tuesday December 17 at 6:00 in the boardroom. The pay 25 levy has an increase of 4.19% over the pay 24 levy. The majority of the increase comes from two areas. The first is an increase in referendum levies and local optional revenues due to higher student counts used in the levy calculation than the previous year. The second is there is no negative adjustment in lease levy funds on the pay 25 levy, but there was a large negative adjustment on the pay 24 levy.

At our Truth in Taxation meeting we also provide a budget update. The reason we do this in December is we have a much better idea of our students count and staffing levels than we do in June when we have to have an original budget approved.

The original 2024-2025 budget showed a general fund deficit of \$419,794. The revised budget is currently projecting a deficit of \$320,671. Higher student counts than originally anticipated and some reductions in expenses account for the majority of the difference from the original budget.

The final audited data for 2023-2024 showed the district having a loss of \$184,659 in the general fund.

While the district can sustain a loss over a two year period, there will be discussions on a long term plan to stabilize the budget.

E-Learning Plans

Legislative Forecast

Last week the Minnesota Management and Budget (MMB) released its forecasted budget over the next biennium, or two year period. In the November forecast there is projected to be a \$616 million balance at the end of the FY26-27 biennium. This is \$1.1 billion less than prior estimates. The long range forecast for the next biennium, or tails budget, for FY 28-29 shows a deficit ranging from \$3.5 billion to \$5.1 billion. MMB will release another forecast in February, and this forecast will drive the two year state budget. General education funding will be seeing an automatic

General education funding will be seeing an automatic increase between 2% and 3% due to inflationary increases for fiscal year 2026. School organizations will continue to press the legislature for additional funding for schools, but it does not look promising with the budget forecast.

Additional funding is needed as the increases in general education funding have trailed inflationary increases by 18.7% since 2003. The 2023 and 2024 legislative sessions also put a lot of pressure on schools financially with new mandates and programs that are not fully funded by the legislature.

Reading Curriculum Update

Our reading curriculum is currently under review as we explore new options to help our students continue excelling on state-mandated tests. We've sent teachers to surrounding schools to collaborate with other educators about their curriculums. Our goal is to ensure we provide the best resources possible to our students, and the reading curriculum committee shares this aspiration.

After-School Detention

If you've read my previous communications, you know that I prioritize being present in the halls, classrooms, lunchrooms, gyms, and other spaces. To support this goal, we strive to minimize office referrals for in-school suspension (ISS). While ISS remains an option, we've also implemented after-school detention as a disciplinary measure. Students assigned to after-school detention stay from 3:15 to 4:15 p.m.

Our lost-and-found collection grew significantly this fall and early winter. To reduce disruptions in the mornings, we've limited hallway traffic so our teaching staff can prepare for the day with minimal interruptions. Moving forward, we will continue this effort but allow students to drop off their backpacks and change into gym shoes upon arrival.

Robotics
